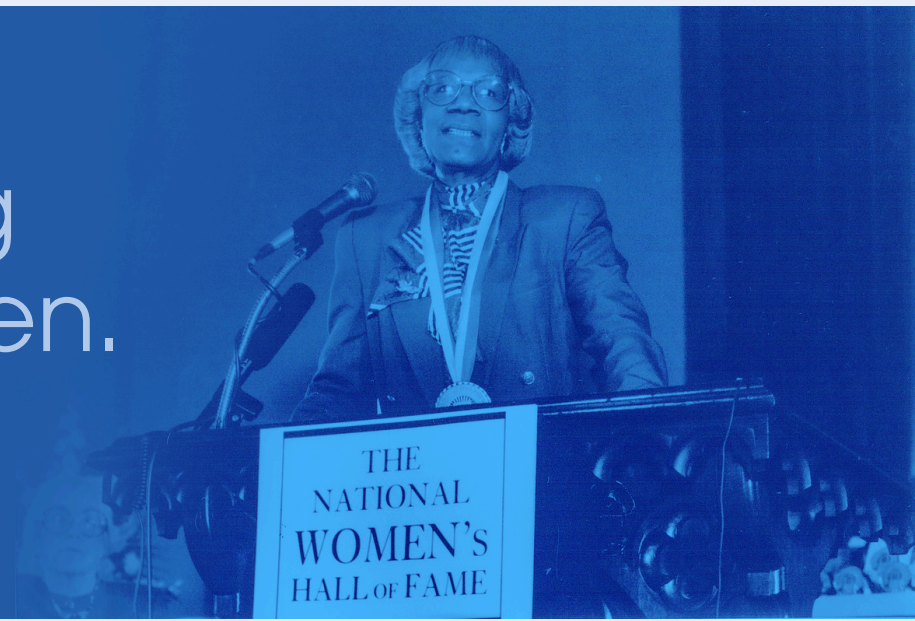

Welcome to Rochester & the George Eastman Museum

We are honored to host the 2026 Induction Ceremony at the George Eastman Museum in Rochester, New York.

Rochester’s connection to the women’s rights movement is deep, formative, and nationally significant. Two weeks after the first Women’s Rights Convention in Seneca Falls, the Rochester Women’s Rights Convention of 1848 convened here, marking the second major gathering of the movement and the first public meeting in the nation presided over by a woman, Abigail Bush.

The George Eastman Museum is the historic estate of George Eastman, the visionary entrepreneur who revolutionized photography and motion picture film. Guests will be welcomed into his beautifully preserved mansion and gardens, experiencing the elegance and innovation that defined his life and work.

A VIP reception before the ceremony in the ballroom of the mansion will provide event sponsors and major donors with exclusive access to inductees. The evening continues in the iconic 500-seat Dryden Theatre, where the Induction Ceremony will take place – a setting that blends history, artistry, and cinematic heritage.

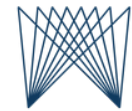

Contemporary (In-Person)



Jackie Joyner-Kersey

Regarded as one of the greatest all-around athletes in history, Jackie Joyner-Kersey is a six-time Olympic medalist and the long-standing world-record holder in the heptathlon. Currently she is known for her major philanthropic work supporting youth and community development through her foundation in East St. Louis, IL.



Adele Smith Simmons

Pioneering academic leader Adele Smith Simmons served as third president of Hampshire College from 1977–1989. She then became the second president of the MacArthur Foundation, where she oversaw more than \$1 billion in global philanthropic initiatives focused on human rights, sustainability, and community development.



S. Mona Sinha

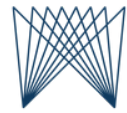
Mona Sinha is the CEO of Equality Now and a globally recognized gender-equality advocate known for driving legal reforms for women and girls worldwide and mobilizing over \$1 billion to advance women's rights and leadership.



Judith Viorst

Acclaimed author, poet and journalist whose work spans adult and children's literature, Viorst is best known for the beloved children's classic, *Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day*, and the psychology best-seller, *Necessary Losses*. Viorst has also written extensively on family life and aging, including her humorous and poignant "decade series" of poetry chronicling the stages of a woman's life, from her 30s through her 90s.

Janet Yellen (Video)

Economist Janet Yellen has held top U.S. economic positions, serving as the 78th Secretary of the Treasury, the first female Federal Reserve chair, and head of the White House Council of Economic Advisers – the only person to lead all three. A respected scholar, she is a prominent figure in macroeconomics and labor economics.

Historical



Edith S. Green (1910-1987)

One of Congress' most influential federal policy architects, Edith Green was a ten-term U.S. Representative from Oregon. Her work helped pass landmark legislation including the National Defense Education Act, the Higher Education Act, and the 1972 Title IX provision prohibiting sex discrimination in education. An early champion of equal pay, she introduced the Equal Pay Act in 1955.



Virginia Hall Goillot (1906-1982)

Legendary American spy Virginia (Dindy) Hall Goillot served with Britain's Special Operations Executive and later the U.S. Office of Strategic Services, organizing resistance networks, coordinating sabotage, and aiding downed airmen across Nazi-occupied France despite having a prosthetic leg. She was the only civilian woman of World War II to receive the Distinguished Service Cross and later served as one of the CIA's pioneering female operatives. *(Photo credit: Lorna Catling)*



Harriet Jacobs (1813-1897)

Harriet Jacobs was an enslaved woman who escaped to freedom and authored *Incidents in the Life of a Slave Girl*, one of the most important firsthand accounts of American slavery. She later became an abolitionist and humanitarian, working to support and educate freed people during and after the Civil War.

Georgeanna Emory Seegar Jones M.D. (1912-2005)

Pioneering reproductive endocrinologist Dr. Georgeanna E.S. Jones's discoveries included proving that human chorionic gonadotropin (hCG) is produced by the placenta, thereby reshaping infertility diagnosis and treatment. Later she co-founded the first successful in vitro fertilization program in the United States, leading to the nation's first IVF birth in 1981.



Audre Lorde (1934-1992)

Groundbreaking poet, essayist and activist Audre Lorde confronted racism, sexism, homophobia, and the complexities of Black female identity. She became an influential voice in feminist and LGBTQ+ movements, co-founding *Kitchen Table: Women of Color Press* and earning major literary honors for her powerful, politically charged writing. Marie Tharp (1920-2006)

Pioneering geologist and oceanographic cartographer, Marie Tharp co-created the first scientific maps of the ocean floor, revealing canyons, ridges, and the Mid-Atlantic Ridge in unprecedented detail. Her discoveries provided crucial evidence for plate tectonics and continental drift, fundamentally reshaping Earth science.
